On their last day of Year 12, the students organised a culture day. They wore cultural clothes and donated £181.86 for The Trussell Trust. At lunchtime, every form group decorated a table in Desenzano and had planned a menu of food from all around the world! A lot of planning went into organising the event and the tables looked simply wonderful! As well as that, the food was delicious! Thank you to all of the Year 12 students and their form tutors who worked hard to ensure everyone had a great experience.

This has been a very busy year for our charity work, both raising funds but also awareness of issues with students. This academic year, the students have continued to work as a collective to raise money for a variety of charities which is Serviam in Action. Charities and events have included a Sponsored Silence, the collection of food hampers, warm clothing and baby clothing, as well as families making financial donations. Charity donations have included Anchor House, Cafod, Mental Health Support, Christmas Charities and the Royal British Legion. We will now focus on a range of projects to support the earthquake recovery in Turkey and Syria and local Food Banks. Over £3000 has been donated to charities thus far this year and we are still collecting monies for Donut Day and Sponsored Walks- Well done to one and all.



We are absolutely delighted to have been working with the TfL scheme STARS to promote healthy travel and lifestyles for the students. As a school, we have a very wide catchment area with students travelling up to 22 miles to attend school daily and one student who lives on the school road! The School Council has worked actively with school leaders to develop mechanisms to support students when travelling on the buses. Our staff actively model travelling on the buses, as their own form of transport to work and the vast majority of school trips involve walking to local places and the use of public transport.



then to make a bespoke Christmas Tree using recycled items for a school-wide competition. The trees ranged from using plastic bottles, wire and multi-woods to highlight sustainability.

Through the project the students were engaging with eco-friendly principles and learnt more about the carbon footprint of waste. Their ideas and designs were shared with the local community and families and the final designs were used round the school.

This year, the Student Council have built upon their initial project and are challenging the school to develop a Flower Wall project in operation- hide those bins! Watch this space!

The student teams have previously enthusiastically made flower walls for mental health awareness events and to raise awareness for domestic violence. The plan for the forthcoming stage two of the sustainability project is to create a legacy wall and turn waste bags, bottles and other used items made out of plastic into a beautiful permanent feature, thus reducing the negative impact on the environment and developing awareness.

We are delighted that the students are harnessing their creativity and innovation, to so visually demonstrate and share their vision of a more sustainable, healthy way of living for us all.

The Upper School Student Council were determined to bring back the legacy events of the school following COVID and to challenge the students of the school to develop a healthy lifestyle through walking, reducing parental car use and making a charitable contribution.

Pre- COVID St Angela's held a legacy walk each year, for Year 7 in the name of a teacher who started the walk and subsequently lost his own battle to cancer - Owen Gayle.

COVID prevented use of the local park for two years and our Year 10 students last year were determined that the legacy should not be lost and wanted to make a change to the patterns of student journeys to school, building on drop a stop as the foundations.

Year 10 therefore organised a full sponsored walk for the cohort, that you could only sign up for if you had walked further than 5 bus stops to school (and they checked each other!)

The Year 10 cohort then completed a sponsored walk around West Ham Park, a 5km walk in total. This encouraged physical activity, supported road safety development and helped familiarise students with the local area and safe spaces to exercise in, while at the same time raising funds for Macmillan Cancer.

The project was extended to a full school walk in June. Well done all!

We walk students to school trips on visits to local places such as St Anthony's Church and to trips. This gives time for road safety education and encourages the use of public transport, increasing physical activity. We also proactively use the TfL transport system and this year trips have included a Year 9 Geography Trip to London Zoo - walking and tube, a Year 11 history trip to SIX - walking and tube and a Post 16 Trip to the News building-walking and tube. This develops student confidence to travel and navigate and in turns increases numbers of students using public transport independently. Every day at the end of the school day there are three dedicated 678 bus services that stop at our main bus stop outside the school. We have active staff duty to promote responsible boarding and behaviour on public transport, to oversee the queue and organise boarding and to encourage a responsible travel ethos. We actively encourage both staff and students to ride to school and have bike sheds for each. The staff have utilised the bike scheme and up to 15 students and staff now ride to school daily.

As part of our Rise Up Days (PHSE) curriculum, our sixth form students had a session delivered on 'kick it out' and how to address hate crimes such as racism. They developed a 'respect' pledge and engaged with community action through this process and their charter has been adopted by the school for safe and active travel for all. We are a healthy school and promote healthy living in the curriculum and health weeks. We promote active travel and the benefits throughout the curriculum and with the travel plan campaigns and activities.

Our Rise Up Days are used to encourage students to think about being active and keeping healthy, through their travel choices. We continually both in this bespoke curriculum and particularly in science and geography connect with sustainable travel options for all, with external workshops from universities and companies- most recently from Linklaters! The Student Council of St Angela's in each year group, were set the challenge of designing a project during the last academic year to support the environment and consider how we can all live a healthy lifestyle in a more sustainable world. The ideas all stemmed from the School Council's wider remit to increase sustainable travel and to meet the target of reducing parental car use in drop offs.

The Key Stage Three Student Councils, all embarked on designing projects that improved the school environment, highlighted the sustainability of our daily lives and challenged students and staff to change their day to day routines.

Every form group from Years 7- 9 were challenged to design and

On the day of their year group's walk, each student will pledge to walk to school under the drop a stop initiative. The full Student Council has voted that the monies raised this year will be for the Syrian/ Turkish Earthquake appeal as the Year 11 student leaders use persuasion and lead by example to instigate change.

We are delighted that the school was awarded the Top Schools Award for London and two East London Awards also. Year 7 students attended the TfL STARS Top Schools Awards 2023 at the Kia Oval to collect our trophy.



SUMMER TERM Rise Up Days

Rise Up Days continued in the summer term with Rise Up Day 5 covering various topics. Year 7 students looked at the importance of oral health as well as the challenges of period poverty. Year 9 learnt about being an active citizen as well as relationships. Year 9 considered modern day slavery as well as Female Genital Mutilation (FGM). Year 10 were taught initial first aid as well as revision skills. Year 11, 12 and 13 looked at the importance of self-examining to stay healthy. Year 11 looked at harassment whilst Year 12 and 13 also looked at the challenges of period poverty.

Rise Up Day 6 had a strong focus on fundraising with all year groups being shown a presentation on the ongoing crisis in both Turkey and especially Syria caused by the earthquake earlier this year. This was then followed with Years 7, 8, 9 and 12 completing a sponsored walk in West Ham Park. In the afternoon, Year 7 and 8 received their spiritual retreat whilst other year groups then looked at a range of issues with Year 9 and 10 looking at protected characteristics and the Prevent agenda against radicalisation and extremism and Year 12 receiving a presentation from the Gambling Education Network (GEN) on the dangers of online gambling. Finally, Rise Up Day 7 focused on student wellbeing with various activities being organised around the school including Sadler's Wells giving students taster classes in various forms of dance from around the world.

However, the work does not stop there! Ms Fontaine, who has coordinated Rise Up Days this year, has met with all Heads of Year to review Rise Up Days for each year group. Parallel to this, Mr Doherty has discussed Rise Up Days with each School Council. This has led to review of both content and delivery to ensure Rise Up Days for the new academic year are even more relevant and engaging, with students themselves delivering sessions as well!

The Brilliant Club

Brilliant Club Graduations- Congratulations to our 14 Year 8 students who graduated from this year's spring Brilliant Club Scholar's Programme. Despite the challenges of having to study an unfamiliar topic at a higher level whilst keeping on top of their normal school workload they did exceptionally well!!

During a 10 week programme, the students worked on their research project 'Through the looking glass': An introduction to Literary Theory. Tamara, their PhD tutor, was very impressed and never had a group receive that many 2:1 and firsts as this cohort and she was full of praise for their study ethic and writing skills when marking their 1500 word final submissions. Their hard work and dedication was celebrated during a graduation event at King's College London alongside students from other schools.

We are incredibly proud of their hard work, well done to them all!

University Progression

A letter from Kateryna - Ukraine to St .Angela's

My Story

With the beginning of a full-scale war in Ukraine, I was forced to leave my country and move to Poland and later to England. This decision was very difficult for me because I was travelling with relatives but without my parents and my beloved pets. I left everyone I loved and went to a new country. But everything changed quickly and after a few months I moved to England with my parents and brother and started a new life.

When I first came to St. Angela's school, the first thing I felt was shock. I was struck by how big and beautiful this school was because everything was surrounded by green trees and beautiful flowers. At first I was scared by the large number of teachers and students, I thought that I would simply get lost and would not know how to find the class I needed. The first days were very difficult for me because I was in an unusual environment .

I fell in love with this school because all the students and teachers were very kind to me. Everyone tried to help and support me in some way. I began to study new subjects and I will never forget my lessons with my Drama teacher because in these lessons I opened myself up and could practise speaking in English. I had an amazing drama teacher who translated tests and all information into Ukrainian for me and even wrote messages for me in Ukrainian when needed.

When I started preparing for the exams I had to learn new material and a lot of new words. I was very worried about the results, so I often walked nervously around school. Later I realised that I didn't need to worry, because I could always ask for help from my teachers and classmates.

I am sad that I am leaving this school and leaving these wonderful teachers who taught me to believe in myself. But I know that an interesting and fun future awaits me, so I confidently turn the page of my life and go forward to meet the future.

Ballet Black Pioneers - Theatre Royal Stratford East






Sandra commented, "It was really fun. I enjoyed the balancing activity and the volleyball".

The dancers performed 'Ravens' which is a dance based on the growth and development of




Food Technology



Year 7 have been developing their bridge and claw knife skills through a variety of practicals. They first practised by cutting a carrot in a variety of ways and then put their knowledge into practise by creating a pasta salad that focussed on the Eatwell guide.



Year 8 students have been learning about fast foods and the long term health impacts. They have then been using this knowledge to recreate their own healthier versions of their favourite fast foods! Hedgehog: A dice game using probability


24® Game: A fast-paced game of mental arithmetic

their GCSE Maths through online interactive maths resources that address key aspects of the curriculum. An English Teacher's Journey

At St Angela's Ursuline School, we are fortunate to have dedicated educators who go above and beyond to provide enriching experiences for our students. One such teacher is Ms. Wharton who has been making waves in the field of literature education. Over the

past two years, Ms. Wharton has pursued a part-time MA in Black British Literature at Goldsmiths University. Through her studies, she has championed inclusivity in literature and worked closely with publishers to develop study guides that highlight diverse voices in British literature.

Exploring Rich and Diverse Literature

Through her MA coursework, Ms Wharton has been exposed to a vast amount of literature that showcases the richness and diversity of British culture. St. Angela's students will be among the first to study *Leave Taking* for their GCSE, paving the way for a more diverse and representative curriculum. By embracing diverse literature and championing inclusivity, Ms Wharton is inspiring students to appreciate and celebrate different voices and perspectives.

We are proud to have Ms. Wharton as an integral part of our school community, as she inspires our students to embrace diversity, challenge stereotypes, and explore the vibrant tapestry of British literature.


Good Bye, Lenin! by Kutlhum

As part of our extended reading project, year 12 French has been studying French philosophy. Le Petit Prince is presented as a childlike tale of friendship and love and yet our students were able to see the deeper parallels between the shallowness of materialism and the innate value of the inner being. We all agreed that the quote, "It is only with the heart that one can see rightly; what is essential is invisible to the eye." is a motto to live by. In this complex text we are analysing questions such as, Why are we here and how should we live? and What brings true happiness?



History

This term, **Year 7** have been exploring 'what does History show women can be?' Students examined the lives of Boadicea, Matilda and Mary Fillis. Students really enjoyed exploring the lives of a diverse range of women and demonstrated how women in the past have been strong leaders and creative.



Year 8 students have been exploring immigration to Britain over time which has been so timely with the 75th anniversary of the arrival of SS Windrush which brought people from the Caribbean to Britain after World War Two. Students had an opportunity to share their migration stories and how their families were affected by migration.(pictures to follow)



Year 9 students who selected GCSE History visited London Dungeons as part of their introduction to the first unit they will study in Year 10 - Crime and Punishment Through Time. It's fair to say the visit certainly kept the girls on their feet as you can see in the pictures!

Science

KS3

This term, **Year 7** students moved on to the Physics topic of Sound and Light which gave them the opportunity to investigate the refraction and reflection of light and to look at sound waves on an oscilloscope.


Year 8 were also kept busy this term when planning investigations and using their scientific knowledge to form a hypothesis when investigating what factors affect the combustion of fuels. (See image1). They recently learned about the various forces that act on objects and factors that affect pressure in gases and liquids with them being able to relate this to floating and sinking.



Year 9 students began the term by taking their next steps by embarking on their transition to G.C.S.E Science with them being introduced to the topic Cell Biology. This enabled them to develop their microscopy skills by looking at animal and check cells using a compound microscope



Moving on, they looked at the creation of the modern periodic table and developed an understanding of its importance to Chemists. Here is a snippet of some of the fabulous models of the history of the atom created by our Year 9 students.



KS4

Year 10 have been incredibly busy revising for their end of year exams and we congratulate Year 11 and Year 13 for completing their examinations. The Science department is really proud of your hard work and determination.

KS5

Year 12 Physicists have returned to us from completing their AS exam in good spirits and have completed various investigations as part of their Practical Endorsement such as determining the speed of sound in a resonance tube and investigating non-ohmic conductors. They have also developed their research and referencing skills through delivering a presentation on how the internal structure of a material of their choice gives rise to a specific property.


Year 12 Biologists have finished the year studying how ecosystems work and carried out a field trip in West Ham Park where they looked at how abiotic factors affect the distribution of organisms in an Ecosystem.

Year 12 Chemistry students continue to stretch themselves in this challenging subject. Over the past term, they have been synthesising and purifying a range of organic chemicals in the labs and have had to learn a huge range of practical techniques as well as methods of analysis to complete these tasks. The practical activities add to the Practical Endorsement, which they will receive at the end of year 13 and, with many of the cohort keen to go on to university in a year's time, this is a real priority for them.



Textiles

Year 8 students have been creating tote bags based on a chosen culture/country. As part of this they have created their own mood board, completed a range of initial ideas and learnt about a range of fabrics that has informed their patchwork choices.



Year 9 students have been studying a range of designers to create their own pattern based on the theme of nature. Using the sublimation printer their designs have then been transferred onto with satin, cotton or polyester using the heat press. They have then sewn in a zip and turned their design into a makeup bag/pencil case. Below is a selection of patterns the students have created using the computer:



Year 10 have continued to explore the theme 'Under the Sea' from their London Aquarium visit in February. Using this as inspiration they have been experimenting with their ideas by creating a range of samples using the techniques of shibori, flouncing, pleating, gathering and batik. During their 10 hour practical mock they have turned these into either a top, dress or jacket.

Year 8 STEM - School Shield for the Lectern



Year 8 and 9 STEM Club - Summer project



Year 12 Dyson Engineering Box



The works displayed in the Summer Exhibition are by our GCSE and A Level classes of 2023. We wish them all the best with their results in August and good luck with their creative, bright futures.




Economics

Geography

KS3

Our Year 7s explored the micro climates that existed within the grounds of the school. Having completed their fieldwork, students analysed the primary data they collected.



Year 8- During this term, our Year 8 embarked on a journey of discovering China. Students examined a number of different topics from China's physical features, population growth, rural to urban migration to the emergence of TNC in China. This unit is very similar to the changing economy unit studied at GCSE level.

KS4


Year 10- Students have been studying the Physical environment - coasts. Our students have explored coastal processes, coastal landforms and coastal management. This unit is extremely important and it relates strongly to our physical fieldtrip. Students also completed their end of year exam.

KS5

Year 12 students have been studying "Population and environment". This is a very interesting topic in which we explore how health can be affected by the physical environment in which you live. Students found this unit very exciting and were keen to explore this unit in more depth. Year 12 Geography students have begun the process of planning and developing ideas for their NEA coursework, which includes the planning fieldwork, conducting fieldwork and analysing their results.

Sociology

This term our Year 10 students have been learning about the Sociology of Education, in particular; the functions that education performs in society, types of schools that exist within the UK, whether private schools should be abolished and alternative forms of education. Students provided some excellent reasons as to why they thought private education should be abolished. They will have the opportunity to attend a trip to Chigwell School next year where they will be able to see some of the key differences between state and private education first hand. We are very proud of the progress our Year 10 students have made throughout the year. Congratulations, you are officially half way through the GCSE course!



This term a group of Year 12 students had the privilege of attending an event titled 'Know Your Place: how society sets us up to fail and what we can do about it' at the London School of Economic and Political Science. The panel of speakers discussed the prospects of social mobility in Britain today, and how we can create opportunities for all. Some of the guest speakers included; Dr Faiza Shaheen - the author of 'Know Your Place', Professor Gary Younge who is an award-winning author, broadcaster and a professor of sociology at the University of Manchester and Mike Savage professor of Sociology at the London School of Economic and Political Science. Our students found the event very insightful and were extremely moved by some of the personal stories discussed by the speakers. This was an excellent opportunity for our Year 12 students to visit one of the most prestigious universities in the country and it provided them with valuable evidence to support their university applications.

We said a fond farewell to our Year 13 sociologists this term. We celebrated their two years of A Level study by playing a game of Jumbo Jenga, with a sociological twist! Each Jenga block was labelled with a recall, application or challenge revision task linked to their A Level topics. From all of us in the Sociology department, we wish them the best of luck in their future endeavours!



After Easter some of our Year 7 Students were given the opportunity to receive after school tuition every Wednesday by Team Up. Their attendance has been amazing and they all feel that they have benefited from some extra support in Maths or English.

The tuition has boosted the students' confidence in both Maths and English, they have written some amazing stories and learnt new mathematical formulas. The students have been commended for the efforts they have made throughout the sessions. 
Psychology

We bid our Year 11 and Year 13 Psychologists a fond farewell as they leave us this summer term. We are extremely proud of their hard work and dedication to the course over the past two years. Our Year 12 students have begun preparing for the next stage in their academic journey...university!

Our learners are inquisitive and keen to learn beyond their exam board specification, as such they have all selected an area of Psychology that they are particularly interested in, and have enrolled on a Future Learn course which will develop their knowledge and understanding in this area further. The students are exploring a wide range of domains which all have a psychological basis, from Forensic Science to Sport Psychology.

For example, Meagan is currently completing a course accredited by UCL entitled 'Childhood Adversity: The Impact



Computer Studies

Year 7 have been studying algorithms that are used to design how a computer program will solve a problem. They have also been looking at how computer systems use algorithms to sort data, students have demonstrated how both a bubble and insertion sorting algorithm works as well as looking at and demonstrating how a linear and binary searching algorithm works. They have been learning about two different types of programming constructs such as sequence and selection and how these are used within the code, they have also used these algorithms and constructs to write code using Python to create their own programs.

Year 8 have been building upon their algorithm knowledge and converting flowchart algorithms into pseudocode algorithms. From this they have been studying the different type of programming constructs that can be used when creating software and how they can use algorithms to help design

how their code is going to run. They have been focusing on programming software using the sequence and selection construct and have been using the python coding language to code their solutions which is free to download from the python website.

Year 9 have finished looking at cyber security, which focused on looking at how we can protect ourselves from cyber-attacks and what makes a cyber-attack. They have also been looking at the current cyber-attacks that have been happening in the world and how frequent these are. Coming up with ways that cyber-attacks could be prevented or if they have happened how the affects could be minimised. They have now moved on to advanced programming using python with a focus on iteration within programming. They have been looking at count controlled and condition controlled loops, designing their own code using algorithms and ensuring that they incorporated the iteration programming construct. Students in year 10 have now completed most of component 1 of the specification. They have been looking at computer networks, connections

and wireless networks. The hardware required to create a network, how each of these work and the advantages and disadvantages of different network topologies. The year 10 then moved onto network security and the threats that could attack a network and how we could minimalise these, looking at recent case study and ransomware attacks in the US on their oil and meat industries. Upon their return they will be looking at the ethical, legal, cultural and environmental issues that relate to computer science and how these could be both negative and positives for individuals and large organisations.

We welcomed back our Year 12 students this term who returned to school after completing their AS examinations to start on their computer science project and A-level content.

We said a fond farewell to our fantastic Year 11 and Year 13 computer scientists this term. We commend them on the commitment they have shown to their studies in preparation for their GCSE and A Level examinations and wish them a restful summer. Best of luck to you all in their future endeavours.
