I wish you all a very happy and holy Christmas period with your families and we return for the Spring Term on Thursday 4th January 2024 for all year groups.



The **Brilliant**

St Angela's has been participating in the prestigious Brilliant Club Scholars Programme for a number of years now and our students have always attained very high results in the final challenging assignment. The Brilliant Club is a university access charity that works with schools and universities across the country to open up the world of academic research and give young people the opportunity to study at university-level in an accessible way.

Following an introductory launch students take part in a series of seven university style tutorials with a PhD tutor, Sopolnawitch



Ponglamjiak, which enhances their critical thinking skills and builds their confidence in preparation for completing a challenging 2,000 word essay which is marked and moderated using university grades. This year's focus is based on Sopolnawitch's PhD research - Lights, Camera, Action: How Critical Lenses Help Us Understand Films and our students are busy learning about different types of Film Theory.

"Brilliant Club has served as a great opportunity for me to explore learning at a university level. Being able to learn about a completely unique subject



CAREER ADVICE AND OPPORTUNITIES

In addition to starting the Careers Club for KS3 students, the main focus for the Careers Advisor this term has been meeting with Year 11 students to talk about their future career aspirations and making the right choices about what they do

In addition to this, Mr James has been preparing Year 10 students for what to expect when they go on work experience.

This included an assembly for the year group when Mr James spoke about the fact that work experience is an opportunity for all students to develop their communication and interpersonal skills in a professional environment. In the coming weeks, the expectations around work experience will be the focus for discussion in Year 10 tutor time and future assemblies.



Rise Up Days have continued to go from strength to strength with the start of the new academic year. The combination of well planned lessons and accompanying resources linked with an increased number of external speakers has meant that students are exploring a range of topics.

Rise Up Day 1 (Tuesday 5th September)

Year 7 spent their first Rise Up Day completing the induction they began when they visited the school in July. This included a welcome assembly with Mr Johnson followed by a school tour and then lessons on keeping healthy and stereotypes. Year 8 considered self management, peer pressure and resilience. Year 9 learnt about social media and building relationships. Year 10 looked at preparing for GCSEs and study skills whilst Year 11 considered wellbeing and trust. Year 12 spent the day at Aylesford to get to know each other and their Form Tutors whilst Year 13 had a day in Thorpe Park as their St Angela's Day celebration.

Rise Up Day 2 (Monday 2nd October & Monday 16th October)

Year 7 considered the Rule of Law and the Equality Act whilst Year 8 learnt about budget ng and the Prevent agenda. Year 9 studied the effects of illegal substances and had a presentation from representatives from Transport of London (TfL) on travelling safely. Year 10 had a focus on employment as they studied finding and applying for a job as well as professional standards in the workplace. Year 11 considered financial literacy and consumer rights whilst Year 12 looked at wealth and wellbeing as well as university life. Finally, Year 13 had a presentation and discussion groups about preparing for university life.

Rise Up Day 3 (Tuesday 7th November & Tuesday 21st November)

The flagship event for Rise Up Day 3 was a performance of 'Knowing Me Knowing You' by Chain Reaction Theatre to all Year 7 and 8 students. The performance focused on students understanding the importance of protected characteristics as well as the impact of harassment and bullying. Year 7 also considered staying safe on the roads and online, whilst Year 8 learnt about the impact of smoking and vaping as well as the benefits of using music to support wellbeing. Year 9 studied managing emotions at puberty and parenthood whilst Year 10 considered positive relationships as well as understanding how criminals attract young people to run county lines. Year 11 learnt about addiction and mental health whilst Year 12 studied the impact of radicalisation and how to manage their digital footprint. Lastly, Year 13 considered staying safe at university and managing risks.

In addition to all the above all students were also taught lessons on our USP virtues for the autumn term and the first half of the spring term. For the first half of the spring term this is 'Grateful and Generous'. The virtue for the autumn term was 'United in Harmony' where students learnt about the importance of diversity as a strength and working together for the common good which brings us neatly to being Courageous and Resilient.



ECO Club

Eco Club students have had a very busy term. The Eco Club met every Wednesday in the Geo Room. Eco Club is made up of students from Year 7 to Year 9. The aim of the Eco Club is to make St Angela's even more environmentally friendly. In order to do so, students have conducted an environmental audit of the school investigating a wide range of environmental areas, ranging from transport, food waste and recycling. Having conducted the audit, the Eco Club has decided they would like to focus on two key areas. This would involve running two main projects throughout this year. The first project involves encouraging sustainable travel to and from school and so far students have created projects which will form a visual display board for others. This will involve organising for all classrooms to have paper recycling bins and encouraging students to use reusable bottles.






Food Art Focaccia

Drama



Students at KS3 have been exploring different topics and working hard to hold on to their creativity as they adapt to drama lessons in a new setting. Students in Year 7 have been working on an excellent piece of work on The Lion, The Witch & The Wardrobe and exploring how Physical Theatre and storytelling can be used to engage an audience. Students in year 8 have created incredible pieces of Physical Theatre in response to Shakespeare's Tempest, Students in Year 9 are exploring social issues and working on a fantastic play called DNA and continue to explore how different styles of theatre can be used to interpret a play. English

This term is our "launch" term. As every year, October marks the beginning of Debate Mate - the national competition where students learn valuable skills in all things debating and a competition our students have won at national level on several occasions.



Ms Pellegrini launched a new lunch time Book Club, aiming to emulate the ever-popular book groups that many adults enjoy in their spare time. We asked one of our new 'members' to give an early review (seen below). And finally, we also launched two new and important texts in Years 10 and 13 respectively. Year 10 studied Winsome Pinnock's Leave Taking, a new GCSE literature set text exploring important themes of identity and belonging. Year 13

studied George Bernard Shaw's Mrs Warren's Profession - an iconoclastic, and therefore thought-provoking, late 19th century play. The Year 10 and 13 teachers, and students too of course, have had to read, research, interpret, analyse, and ultimately, get to grips with challenging new material and we have loved every minute of it.

Learning in RE

It has been a busy half term in RE. All Key Stage Three students have been studying the units under the new RE Catholic Curriculum. This term they explored themes relating to Creation and Covenant and also prophecy and promise. Topics covered included the importance of Creation in Year 7, the role





of the 10 Commandments in Year 8 and the significance of Mary in Year 9. To celebrate this wonderful work two displays were put up in the RE classrooms; one of stained glass creation images and another of the purpose of the 10 Commandments.

Year 10 students have been busy this term exploring the topics of Creation, Incarnation and also human rights. Many students have enjoyed being able to unpack the purpose of human rights and connect them to the teachings of Jesus and Christian faith.

Sixth Form Open Evening provided an opportunity for Year 11 students to trial a taste of A Level RE. Two morality activities were set up to challenge the students to think critically and use their understanding of moral decision making to make swift choices. One activity was the famous train dilemma which was recreated with wooden toy tracks and lego men. This activity led to some very interesting debates about how we make moral decisions.

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Maths



KS3

A group of our wonderful Year 8 students have been working together at lunchtimes to prepare for the Jack Petchy Count on Us Secondary Maths Challenge. The Jack Petchey Foundation has worked in partnership with the Mayor's Fund for London since 2014 to deliver the Count on Us Maths Secondary Challenge. It is a unique, inter-school maths programme for Year 7, 8 and 9 students across London, which aims to improve confidence and fluency in maths. Students practise in school and can compete in an exciting maths tournament against their peers, with the aim of reaching the Grand Final held at City Hall.

Economics



The Economics department arranged a wonderful trip for the Year 13 students to the Bank of England in October. During this trip, students learnt about the key functions of the Bank of England and their role in stabilising the financial sector of the economy. Our students found this trip extremely beneficial and enjoyable.

Our Year 12 economists have begun their A

Level course by learning about the different elasticities of supply and demand. This topic has allowed students to understand how businesses make their pricing decisions. For example, branded

The competition is an excellent chance for mathematically gifted pupils to challenge themselves as they strive to get a grade A*. The visit introduced students to different types of problems and required them to apply their knowledge and understanding in new and exciting ways. We are pleased to report that all three students achieved a merit award!

Below is a reflection from Afrah about her experience of the competition:

'Participating in the Maths Olympiad for Girls was an exciting experience that I thoroughly enjoyed. The challenging problems pushed me to think outside the box and apply mathematical concepts in creative ways. It was a true test of my problem-solving skills and every question posed a unique puzzle to solve. Moreover, the event provided me with the opportunity to meet and engage in collaborative discussions with like-minded individuals who shared my passion for maths.'

Our Year 13 economists have completed all of microeconomics and a key focus of this term was market structures. Did you know that Shell Plc recorded record profits of \$43.36bn in 2022, the highest ever for the firm? As the economists of tomorrow, it was amazing to see their engagement in this topic area! They have now begun their journey into international economics; looking

specifically at globalisation and how exchange rates work. The Year 13 students have also learnt about the different ways firms integrate and reasons for collusive behaviour.

Politics

Following in the footsteps of world leaders such as Barack Obama (who spoke to the House of Commons and the House of Lords here) our Politics students visited The Great Hall in the Houses of Parliament. The Great Hall is a truly historic building (built in 1097 by the son of William the Conqueror) and was the building where Queen Elizabeth lay in state before her funeral.

Our students were duly awestruck by this majestic building. Following this tour, the students returned to the House of Lords where they engaged in seminars and debates regarding the problems with democracy in the UK. From their comments I understood that our students are less than impressed by the current state of affairs.

Following the seminars/debates our students headed off to St James Park for lunch - the autumn sunshine certainly feels like a distant memory. Interestingly, whilst our students are certainly not afraid of MPs, the sight of a duck walking towards them was apparently terrifying...

After lunch we walked to the National Gallery, which is rightly famous for its many political paintings, it is now becoming famous as a venue for political protest as seen when young members of 'Just Stop Oil' recently protested there.





Business

We have had some very exciting developments in Business Studies this year. Year 10 has had a very bright start to their Business Studies GCSE course focusing on the theme of investigating small businesses. The students have revelled in discovering the dynamic nature of businesses as well as the different marketing methods and how businesses manage costs and revenue. The students are also on course for some exciting projects in the new year which will allow them to apply their business knowledge to real life situations. We have also had a number of new additions to business this year and these students are working very hard to develop their business knowledge which is so positive to see.

Our Year 11 students have been very busy expanding their business knowledge and tackling the topics surrounding building a business. This theme builds on from the foundations they laid for themselves in Year 10 and expands their knowledge and exposure to more business concepts in greater detail. They are learning about the wider business world, globalisation, business ethics and environmental factors. These topics link very nicely with subjects they may be interested in at A Level from obviously business studies but economics, politics and a number of other subjects also.

Year 12 have made an excellent start to their A Level journey in Business. They are covering both themes in the AS specification looking at markets and people and managing business activities. These two themes build on the foundations of A Level Business which students can then build on from further into the course.

As well as the course content there have been a number of webinars and talks that are being arranged for the business and economics students to enable them to build up their list of credentials for future university applications.

Year 13 students have been hard at work this year with a number of students applying for business or business related degree



courses, including accounting, finance, economics and marketing to name a few. The business and economics departments worked in collaboration to organise a very successful trip to the Bank of England Museum where students were able to learn about the origin of money and the wider role of money in the economy. Students were especially interested in the safe cracking challenge and the presentation from the bank staff which included fascinating stories about the gold in the vaults of the bank.

Overall Business is as busy as ever and our fantastic students are pushing themselves all the way to exam success. Keep up the great work!

Art

GCSE and A-level Art Trip to the National Portrait Gallery

"On Tuesday 3rd October, Year 11 art students visited the newly reopened National Portrait Gallery to explore the permanent exhibition and take inspiration for our coursework. We were able to observe a variety of works (including paintings, photographs, death-mask casts and sculptures) from the 15th century to the present day. The collection shows the evolution of the portrait and how artists have recorded people through time, using portraiture to indicate power, status and wealth. For example, portraits from the Tudor period mainly depicted royalty, adorned in intricate jewels and regal fabrics. I was interested in how artists use different mediums and styles to emphasise the individuality of their technique as well as the work of photographers who also had their work displayed at the gallery; this encouraged us to consider the stylistic choices we could make in our own portrait developments. After exploring the galleries, we were able to make our own recordings, sketching directly from the artworks as we began to prepare for our practical mock exam." (Chyna - Year 11)

"On October 3rd, I was fortunate to visit the National Gallery. The trip was organised for the Year 13 A Level Art students as an opportunity to explore important art works first hand and develop our knowledge in connection with our written study. My personal theme for investigation is "The changing portrayal of women through art history" and I am researching artworks from the 13th century through to contemporary art. As well as exploring works in connection with my study, I was able to admire a large collection of paintings which was a remarkable experience. The piece that captured my interest most was the exquisite largescale depiction of 'The Execution of Lady Jane Grey' by Paul Delaroche. This 19th-century oil painting illustrates the tragic story of the 17-year-old Lady Jane Grey prior to her execution, led by Sir John Brydges. Grey wears an almost illuminated white dress which represents her innocence. The exaggerated distress of her wailing ladies in waiting combined with their body language and pose reinforces their despair. The large scale work creates the illusion of the muses being lifesize and consequently manipulate the viewer into believing they are present at the execution itself. A skill I noticed in this painting by Delaroche was his use of soft and blended brushstrokes, which is something you can only observe when you see the painting first hand. Visiting the National Gallery was an amazing experience. The trip was very enjoyable and also helped provide me with a deeper understanding of how an artist can create drama and impact within a painting." (Ruby Mai - Year 13)

















Geography

Year 7 spent their first term developing their location knowledge through the book 'Prisoners of Geography- Our World Explained in 12 Simple Maps'. They concluded this topic with some fantastic projects; learning a language from one region/country they had studied, making a model of a landmark, cooking cakes or dinner inspired by a country, research posters and even designing a Minecraft world.

To finish the term they focused on key maps skills that will support their learning in KS3. We are looking forward to their hard work in their next topic of 'Coasts'.


Year 8 started with 'Development' then moved onto 'Climate Challenges'. 'Development' involves looking at the ways countries are categorised based on more than just wealth. This required practising key skills of using and applying data about countries as well as introducing a wide range of new vocabulary. The very topical 'Climate Challenges' involved the greenhouse effect as well as looking at past and present causes, then finishing with global impacts. With COP28, it was an opportunity to discuss solutions, activism and global agreements.

Year 9 began with 'Tectonic Hazards'. Students learnt the physical processes then examined case studies of contrasting locations to assess factors that affect the scale of disasters. They had an opportunity to design our own Earthquake Proof buildings.



They then looked at 'Global Fashion', focusing on the globalisation of the fashion industry. The Trading Game enabled them to think deeply about the unfair nature of global trading and the exploitation of resources.

They examined the negative impacts of fast fashion focusing on working conditions, then pollution and waste due to the globalised industry. We will finish this topic next term by looking at solutions.





Year 10 focused on Hazards, with sub-topics on earthquake, volcanoes, tropical storms, extreme weather events and Climate Change. They have been practising their application of case study knowledge to write 'assess' 9 mark questions. Year 11 completed 'Living World' examining ecosystems, rainforests and hot deserts. Embedding a range of exam practice questions throughout the topic has really supported the students with their approach to all the types of exam questions to thoroughly prepare them for their mocks. We are proud of all their perseverance and resilience.

The Year 12 students have had a very busy start of the year. In Hazards students have examined seismic and volcanic case studies to assess the contributing factors to the severity of the disasters. They have had opportunities to practise statistical and data analysis as well as developing their exam techniques gradually throughout the term. In Changing Places, students have explored the meaning of place - what does a sense of place actually mean? Students have studied Detroit focusing on deindustrialisation and current efforts of Detroit's regeneration project.



Year 13 have completed their Independent Investigations which are worth 30% of their A Level. They designed their own investigation on an area of their choosing, collected fieldwork and produced their report with sophisticated data presentation, analysis and evaluation. This highly valued piece of work will support them in their university and career pathways.

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History

This term Year 7 students have been examining the Norman invasion of Britain creating a range of storyboards to summarise the key events. To challenge students, the History Department organised for the National Archives to run a workshop on Norman sources which really helped students develop a greater appreciation of the significance of the Norman invasion and we were really impressed by their developing source skills.





Year 8 students have been exploring the introduction of the Reformation. It has been great to hear the students debate who they think had the biggest impact on religion. Furthermore, students explored the work of Miranda Kaufmann who investigated the lives of 'Black Tudors' which highlighted that the black community played an important role in Tudor England including being employed as trumpeters in the Court of Henry VIII and sea divers.









Year 9 students have been exploring the legacy of the British Empire with a focus on the Caribbean and India as case studies. In order to support their understanding, students visited the Maritime Museum in Greenwich where students explored the link between migration and the British Empire.







Year 9 girls who have been attending History Club at lunchtime on a Wednesday explored the significance of the arrival of SS Windrush in 1948 by exploring accounts of people who arrived in Britain from Collin Grant's 'Homecoming: Voices of Windrush'.

Year 10 students have started their journey for GCSE History by examining changing crimes over time in Britain. Whilst Year 11 students have been focusing on the growth of the Nazi Party in Year 11. We are very proud of their hard work and dedication!

Year 12 students have been examining how Britain has transformed since 1918 with lots of links being made to the current cost of living crisis and the implications for Britain based

on the experience of Britain in the 1970s. Students in Year 12 also visited Tate Britain to explore the 'Women in Revolt' exhibition and participated in a workshop run by the Museum of Youth focusing on different youth sub-groups of the 1950s - 70s.







Finally, Year 13 has been exploring the causes of the American War of Independence and the importance of Martin Luther King Jr for the Civil Rights Movement. In preparation for their coursework, students visited the National Archives in Kew to examine British sources on the movement and had an opportunity to see an original copy of the American Declaration of Independence.





Finally, the department welcomed Mr Belemy, Mr Doherty and Ms Wood to the department and we would like to take this opportunity to thank them for all their hard work this term.

Holocaust Education Trust Workshops

This year we had the opportunity to participate in the Holocaust Education Trust's Lessons from Auschwitz project which helps students to understand the Holocaust in more detail.

"As part of the project we had the opportunity to visit Poland which entailed visiting both Auschwitz I and Auschwitz II-Birkenau. After a tour of Oświęcim, the Polish town where both camps are located, we were able to understand the pre-war context of the racial tensions in the area which ultimately led to the Holocaust. Visiting Auschwitz I, we were guided through the camp, seeing that most of the buildings had been preserved for educational purposes and were able to truly understand the scale of the genocide that took place. In each building, all of which had previously been used to house the prisoners of the camp, a specific relic of the Holocaust was explained and displayed, including clothing, crockery and luggage. Being able to walk through the camp and the barracks was a truly overwhelming experience, but very important when understanding the Holocaust in full.

The engaging yet devastating visit to Auschwitz-Birkenau was followed by a seminar in which we had the opportunity to speak to the Holocaust survivor, Manfred Goldberg. Whilst the trip to Auschwitz provided eyeopening insight and depth nothing compared to hearing Manfred's testimony. With great dejection he revealed the

more intimate details of his experience, how he managed to survive by lying about his age upon arrival and how his mother was sent with a group who were destined for the gas chambers but managed to escape and hide amongst his group and was fortunately never caught. Although some would describe both these experiences as luck, it is impossible to ignore the horrifying situation Manfred was in; how one would have struggled to feel any sort of 'luck' in such an environment. Manfred went on to describe the dreadful experiences he faced after this; the death marches, the starvation and the death of his younger brother at the age of 9. And whilst we all felt sheer relief as he detailed his eventual liberation, it was dampened when he described the deaths of some following the liberation as they had not eaten in so long that their bodies could not handle the food given to them by the British soldiers. Manfred's testimony enabled us to view the victims as more than one group; they weren't just the figure '6 million', they were all people with lives who had individual, terrifying experiences. Manfred left us with the message that we should, "Live life with an open mind... because if good people stay silent, you're giving evil a chance to triumph. Silence never helps the oppressed and when you witness injustice speak up."


KS4











Crochet Club

Sociology



Our Year 13 sociologists have had a fantastic start to the new academic year exploring the topics of globalisation and crime. A selection of the Year 13 cohort were lucky enough to attend a trip to The Royal Courts of Justice and The Old Bailey in October. The trip was designed to provoke interesting discussions regarding whether incarceration is an effective punishment to deter individuals from committing crime as well as offering effective rehabilitation. Our students were taken on a tour by an experienced criminal journalist covering both the Royal Courts of Justice and the Old Bailey followed by a wander through the secret alleys and courtyards of the nearby Inns of Court, in the footsteps of some of the country's most renowned legal minds. Our students were given a printed guide with details of the most interesting cases being heard that day compiled with the information from the guide's contacts



at the court. They then had the chance to watch any cases of interest in the public galleries at The Old Bailey. Our students found the whole experience absolutely fascinating, especially those who are intending to study Law at university.

Year 12 sociologists have had a busy term getting to grips with the demands of their A Level studies. This term they have explored the different aspects of identity; for example how we are socialised into class and gender identities and how they are changing. In addition students have been examining the process of sociological research by assessing the usefulness of a range of research

This term our Year 11 sociologists have been learning about crime and deviance as well as preparing for their December mock exams. They have explored definitions of

crime and deviance and how theories like Marxism, functionalism and feminism explain crime and deviance. A group of Year 11 students attended a trip to The London Dungeons in September. Parents and carers of the winners have all been notified, certificates awarded and SIMs points








PE Theatre Trip to Disney's Newsies

British Rowing Talent Identification

Six students from Year 10 -13 were selected to participate in the British Rowing Talent ID programme. Initially they were selected as females must be at least 175cm and males 186cm tall.

The students took part in a series of tests which have identified athletes who have trained to become World and Olympic Champions. The students height, weight and arm span were taken as different body types favour different sports. Rowers require a combination of strength and endurance so at school their strength was tested. The students had to undertake three exercises which measured leg press, arm press and arm pull to





gain an understanding of their general body strength. They will go forward to test their endurance looking at their maximum oxygen uptake (V02 max).

Congratulations to Joshua and Ethan who were selected to participate in the next round of the British Rowing Talent ID programme. We wish them well in the next testing stage.

GB Rowing Performance Development Academy: Daniela's Experience



Daniela has been part of the GB Rowing Performance Development Academy since October 2022 and here she updates us on her experience:

'I have felt and seen massive progress during my journey, including being part of NJIRC (National Junior Indoor Rowing Competition) where I placed 3rd winning a bronze medal and also competed at LYG rowing placing 2nd. I aim to place first in March 2024 in both of these competitions. As well as this, I attended my first on-water sculling regatta in Reading in June where I also placed 2nd place in Womens J15 500m, and took part in Head race at the Docks in November. Here I competed in two races, a distance of 3km, placing first in the U16s single scull boat, and first again in my double scull rowing boat with another athlete in the U18s category.

At the Rowing Academy we train at compulsory monthly camps at Nottingham Watersports Centre, where we can be promoted into higher groups. This is dependent on our correct water speed (starting at 75% of an Olympic gold champion rowers speed), land assessments and water drills and skills.

The recent goal set for me by my coach is to be competing nationally in the summer of 2024. I hope to be representing the Great Britain Rowing team against France, as he sees great potential in my training over an eight week period. This has been an amazing opportunity and I've loved every second of it. I'm very much looking forward to trying to achieve this goal.'

Associate Schools Programme

St Angela's work closely with Sadler's Wells, to embed arts-inspired activities into the school day. Together, we create more opportunities for students to watch, explore and learn through dance, drawing on Sadler's Wells' diverse artistic programme.

Sadler's Wells Associate School Showcase

Dance students were given a wonderful opportunity to participate in a day at Sadler's Wells. The morning started in the Lilian Baylis Theatre with a warm welcome from all the staff who would be working with the students throughout the day. It included the stage manager, lighting and music technicians, photographer and members of the Learning and Engagement team. The dancers undertook a tour of the building with Sharika and Zeynep. It was very special and they were able to go backstage and speak to one of the technicians and had the wonderful experience of standing on the main stage and looking out towards the 1500 seater auditorium, which was amazing. After the tour they had a dance workshop with Sarah, who had choreographed one of the pieces that the dancers would be performing later. The dancers then had time to tech the two pieces that they would be performing as part of the showcase. It was a lovely experience undertaking a technical rehearsal on the stage with a professional team. The students had a short lunch break and got ready for their performance. Message In A Bottle by Zoonation: The Kate Prince Dance Company

Dancers who performed brilliantly at the Centenary Mass for the Ursuline Sisters were invited to see Message in a Bottle at the Peacock Theatre. Message In A Bottle was initially inspired by Sting's track Desert Rose and through the narrative, the peaceful village of Bebko is alive with joyous celebrations. Suddenly it comes under attack and everything changes forever.



The three siblings, Leto, Mati and Tana, must embark on perilous journeys in order to survive. Message In A Bottle is an uplifting and poignant tale of humanity and hope that reflects displacement, immigration and survival, using a range of dance styles and breath-taking athleticism. The St. Angela's dancers loved watching the production with some saying "it was the best show they had seen".



Alvin Ailey American Dance Theatre

Dancers from St Angela's had the opportunity to attend a matinee performance by Alvin Ailey American Dance Theater as part of the Sadler's Wells Associate School Programme. The programme was called 'Ailey Classics' and the company performed four ballets that had been created by Alvin Ailey from the 1960s to the 1980s. These works are regarded as masterpieces by audiences and dance critics around the world. The first piece was The River which is a full company work that suggests tumbling rapids and meandering streams on a journey to the sea. Ailey's allegory of birth, life and rebirth using water as his inspiration.

Next Pas de Duke is a modern dance translation of a classical pas de deux, originally created in 1976. The work consists of five solos and duets that showcase the wonderful technical and virtuosity of the dancers. It is playful ballet as the two dancers try to express a game of one-upmanship, all danced to the brilliant music of Duke Ellington.

Cry is Ailey's signature solo and was created as a birthday present for his mother. Alvin Ailey's mother could be considered the archetypal Ailey woman – strong, dignified, generous and loving. Ailey dedicated this piece to "all Black women everywhere – especially our mothers." In this three-section solo, the dancer, clad in a white leotard and long ruffled skirt, brings the audience on a journey of bitter sorrow, brutal hardship and ecstatic joy.

Using African American spirituals, song-sermons, gospel songs and holy blues. Ailey described the memories that inspired Revelations as "blood memories" because they were so strong, he felt they were part of him as much as the blood that ran through his veins. Divided into three sections, it journeys through a mournful "Pilgrim of Sorrow"; the baptismal second section, "Take Me to the Water"; and "Move Members, Move," depicting an uplifting spiritual community.

The dance students thoroughly enjoyed the programme and enjoyed talking about the different dances and dance styles that they saw.

Sadler's Wells Black History Month Associate School Day

Year 10 GCSE and Dance Club members were invited to participate in a Black History Month Day at Sadler's Wells Theatre. The dancers took part in various sessions which celebrated Black Creatives and UK-based artists. At the start of the afternoon Laura, the Learning & Engagement Manager at Sadler's Wells, took the group on a tour backstage at Sadler's Wells Theatre. Here the group learnt about some of the technical aspects involved in the creation of a production. They were able to see the set for English National Ballet, had the opportunity to stand on the main stage and look at the performers view from a proscenium stage. The students then went front of house to see the well which has been on site at the theatre since the 1680s and is still in use today.



The next part of the day was a dance workshop with Sunanda and Issac. The students explored the history of Hip Hop which is celebrating its 50th anniversary. They spoke about the four components of Hip Hop: MC, music, movement and graffiti art. The students were taught an old skool hip hop dance inspired by original Street Dance pioneers The Lockers and Soul Train. They performed movements such as rocksteady, sling, camel walk, and funky chicken. At the end of the dance they performed a stylised handshake. The atmosphere in the Lilian Baylis studio was exceptional as all the students were enjoying themselves through new found movement as for many they were learning a new style of dance. Afterwards, the students took part in a Q&A with Sunanda and Issac. Here they learnt about their experiences as dancers in a professional industry as well as how their heritage had influenced them.

The final part of the day was a Digital Exhibition in The Khan Studio. Four screens were set up for the students to explore a range of dance creatives from the season of Celebrating Black Dance. Year 7s watched Revelations by Alvin Ailey, Speak Volumes by Alexandra Seutin and Negus, A film by Akeim Toussaint Buck. Year 9 and GCSE Dancers watched Patience J, a leader in Afro Dance and Precious Adams a ballet dancer with ENB.

TLC Scholastic Book Fair

St Angela's has a fantastic culture of reading and the Scholastic Book Fair plays an important role in this, along with our other reading initiatives such as our World Book Week and Reading Programme.

Morning Reading Programme

Reading for pleasure is transformative for students' academic success and personal wellbeing and it is therefore a priority in St Angela's that every student is able to access the curriculum to enable them to fulfil their full potential.



Following a reading test during their English lesson, students who are identified as benefiting from additional reading support are enrolled into the Reading Programme. Students meet to read as part of a small group with a staff member or trained Sixth Form Reading Mentor and focus on developing reading confidence, fluency and comprehension. This term they have been reading Freeze by Chris Priestley and When Our Worlds Collided by Danielle Jawando, and plans are in hand for both authors to visit and speak to the students in the new year!

Computer Science

Year 7

Students began their computer science journey at St Angela's by focusing on e-safety and how they can stay safe online. They have also been looking at their digital footprint and how they can limit the impact of their digital footprint, and how they can keep their digital footprint safe.

Year 8

Year 8 students have been exploring how the CPU (Central Processing Unit) works within a computer system and the components that make up a CPU. Students have been looking at how primary memory and secondary storage work together to increase the performance of computer systems and the characteristics of secondary storage and what they should look for when buying different secondary storage devices.

Year 9

Students have been exploring how data is represented in computer systems and how images, video and sound is stored within a computer system. They have been learning how to convert denary numbers into binary, adding binary numbers together, converting between hexadecimal and binary, as well as hexadecimal to denary.

Year 10

Year 10 have made a fantastic start to the academic year and their GCSE studies exploring the Von Neumann computer systems architecture and the way that computer systems memory and storage works. They have been looking at the different types of hardware and software, the way the computer systems use the different types of primary and secondary memory and how all these work together to increase the performance of the CPU.

Year 11

Year 11 have had another fantastic start to the academic year and have been exploring different programming constructs, sorting and searching algorithms, and how to use a trace table within a program to identify any logical errors. They have been writing some fantastic code.

Year 12

Year 12 have been exploring the characteristics of contemporary processors, input, output and storage devices and how these could be used to exchange data. They have been at software and software development as well as how databases are designed and

used within businesses. Moving on

they explored the legal and ethical

issues relating to computer science and how technology can have an impact on culture and social aspects of people's lives.

Year 13

Finally, Year 13 students have been continuing to explore how to problem solve using programming, different types of processors and different sorting and searching algorithms. They have been looking at the more advanced programming method of object oriented programming. The Year 13 have been developing their programming project to include all the skills that they have been learning and the department is delighted with the progress they have made and the solutions that they are coming up with. Inspiring Digital Enterprise Award open to all year groups

The Inspiring Digital Enterprise Award, known as iDEA is an international award-winning programme that helps you develop digital, enterprise and employability skills which is open to all year groups. This allows the students to develop their talents and gain allimportant knowledge and information about the digital world. Through a series of online challenges, students can win career-enhancing badges, unlock new opportunities and, ultimately, gain industry-recognised Awards that help you stand out from the crowd.


