Rise Up - Serviam and Preferential Option for the Poor

RISE UP Day 5 focused on essential life skills and raising awareness around some of the challenges young people may face. We were delighted to welcome Growing Against Violence, an organisation dedicated to supporting young people in making positive choices. They delivered engaging sessions to our Year 7 and Year 8 students. Year 7 explored "Gangs: Myths & Realities," which aimed to dispel common misconceptions about gang culture and equip students with the confidence to make safe decisions. Meanwhile, Year 8 participated in "Weapons: Choices and Consequences," a session which addressed the dangers and repercussions of weapon-carrying and encouraged open, honest discussion about safety.

In addition to these workshops, Year 7 also learned about oral health and first aid, ensuring they are equipped with knowledge to look after themselves and respond in emergencies. Year 8 had sessions on the importance of eating well, staying active, and staying safe online, highlighting both physical and digital wellbeing. Year 9's programme was designed to support them as they transition into the next key stage, with workshops on managing stress, becoming upstanders rather than bystanders, and recognising signs of unhealthy relationships at home. Year 10 students delved into the complexities of romantic relationships, learning about managing conflict, fertility, and marriage, all within a safe and supportive environment.

A key feature of RISE UP Day 5 was a dedicated USP lesson on Serviam, our



school's guiding principle of "I will serve." Students explored how Serviam is deeply rooted in Catholicism and discussed ways in which they can continue to demonstrate this value both within school and in their wider communities. This reflective session encouraged students to consider what service means in their daily lives and how small acts of kindness and responsibility contribute to the wellbeing of others.

These sessions were not only informative but also interactive, encouraging students to ask questions, share their thoughts, and gain practical advice that they can apply in their daily lives.

RISE UP Day 6 was dedicated to wellbeing, creativity, and community. The entire school came together to support a fundraiser for Unicef for Gaza's Children, participating in a sponsored walk and contributing to a striking whole-school display. This event was a wonderful example of our students' compassion and commitment to making a positive impact in the wider world.

Throughout the day, students enjoyed a variety of wellbeing activities. In the main hall, everyone took part in a quiz, which was a fantastic way to build teamwork and school spirit. Students also explored why friendships matter and made friendship bracelets, strengthening connections across the school. Each





pupil had the chance to participate in a creative and fun workshop, providing a welcome opportunity for self-expression and relaxation. The playground was transformed into a festival of fun, with extra games and activities on offer, and the canteen treated everyone to ice cream, adding to the joyful atmosphere. Meanwhile, our Year 12 students enjoyed a well-deserved trip to celebrate their achievements this year, marking the end of a busy and successful term.

Year 12

On Wednesday 25th June, our Year 12 Sociologists attended the production of One Way Out at the Brixton House Theatre. Year 9, 10 and 12

In the summer term students in Year 9. 10 and 12 participated in an exciting piece of research conducted by UCL's faculty of Education and Society. The purpose of the research was to investigate the impact of smartphone technology on young people's lives. Professor Jessica Ringrose was leading the research and has 20 years of experience carrying out research with young people in schools and assisting her was her Research Officer Chiara Fehr who is a doctoral candidate at UCL. The research consisted of several focus group interviews with groups of up to 5-7 young people in

years 9, 10 and 12 and the interviews included a series of questions regarding smartphone usage, group discussions and creative collaborative tasks. The students found the day incredibly interesting and really made some very insightful points about the use of smartphone technology in young people's lives! They made us proud. It was also very helpful for our Year 10 and 12 students to witness research methods in action. Students were able to critically analyse the use of focus group interviews which is a skill they need in their GCSE and A Level examinations.





Lastly, Year 11 and 13 have been working hard this term preparing for and completing their formal examinations. We wish them the very best of luck with their upcoming results!

Eric Underwood's Ballet Experience

St. Angela's dancers teamed up with Lister Community School to take part in a ballet workshop led by ex-Royal Ballet Soloist Eric Underwood. It was an incredible experience, especially for the GCSE dancers who are currently studying Infra by Wayne McGregor, a piece in which Eric was part of the original cast. The day began with Eric sharing his inspiring journey into ballet. As a child, he loved dancing at home but did not begin formal training until the age of 14. After walking past a ballet class following a theatre school audition, he asked the teacher if he could join in and from that moment, his journey began. Despite being one of the only boys in his class, he quickly progressed, and just a year later, he was awarded a scholarship to the School of American Ballet in New York City, where he was the only African-American student in his class.



After graduating, Eric joined the Dance Theatre of Harlem and became a soloist by the end of his first season. In 2003, he moved to the American Ballet Theatre, where he and Misty Copeland were the only Black dancers. He was spotted while on tour in London and invited to join The Royal Ballet in 2006 as a First Artist. Two years later, he was promoted to Soloist, and many roles were created especially for him.

The St Angela's dancers were thrilled to be taught by Eric. The workshop

began with centre work, including pliés, tendus, and jumps, before moving on to phrases across the floor and a series of turns. The choreography was challenging, but the students remained focused and eager to learn from such an accomplished artist. It was clear that Eric had a true passion for teaching and for giving young dancers the opportunity to express themselves through ballet. For many, this was their first experience of learning the genre.

The class was so engaging that even Ms Jarvis could not resist joining in and thoroughly enjoyed the chance to be taught by such a remarkable dancer. Lena said "The workshop was the best we have even participated in. I loved the experience!"

GCSE dancers, along with members of the Year 7 and 8 dance club, attended a matinee performance by BRB2, the Birmingham Royal Ballet's emerging company. The spotlight was on some of the finest young ballet dancers from around the world, aged 18 to 22.

They delivered a powerful and skillful performance featuring works originally curated by Serge Diaghilev, whose legendary troupe of dancers, musicians and designers fled Russia over a century ago, setting a bold new standard for creativity in European dance. The repertoire included The Firebird, Spectre de la Rose, Les Sylphides, and Scheherazade, a beautiful and historically rich collection, perfect for introducing our students to the legacy of classical ballet.

This year, a group of dedicated St Angela's students travelled to Camden to take part in the Step Into Dance regional platform, Step Around Town. The students have shown outstanding commitment, attending weekly classes led by professional dance artist Jasmine Hall through the Step Into Dance programme.

As part of this exciting annual showcase, our dancers performed alongside other schools from across London, celebrating creativity, movement and expression.

St Angela's presented their piece titled All You Children - a powerful and collaborative dance exploring themes of unity, trust, and shared strength. The choreography focused on tipping, weight-sharing and partner work, with students pushing themselves creatively and physically through intricate lifts and fluid transitions. The piece was inspired by each dancer's personal reflections on the changes they hope to see in the world, no matter how big or small.

Computer Studies

Year 7 have been studying algorithms that are used to design how a computer program will solve a problem. They have also been looking at how computer systems use algorithms to sort data, students have demonstrated how both a bubble and insertion sorting algorithm works as well as looking at and demonstrating how a linear and binary searching algorithm works. They have been learning about two different types of programming constructs such as sequence and selection and how these are used within the code, they have also used these algorithms and constructs to write code using scratch to create their own programs.



Year 8 have been building upon their algorithm knowledge and converting flowchart algorithms into pseudocode algorithms. From this

they have been studying the different type of programming constructs that can be used when creating software and how they can use algorithms to help design how their code is going to run. They have been focusing on programming software using the sequence and selection construct and have been using the python coding language to code their solutions which is free to download from the python website (Python 3.11).



Year 9 have finished looking at data in computer systems and advanced programming using python with a focus on the two types of iteration. They had been looking at count controlled and condition-controlled loops, designing their own code using algorithms and ensuring that they incorporated the iteration programming construct.

Year 10 have now completed most of component 1 of the specification. They have been looking at computer networks, connections and wireless networks. The hardware required to create a network, how each of these work and the advantages and disadvantages of different network topologies. The Year 10 then moved onto network security and the threats that could attack a network and how we could minimalise these, looking at recent case study and ransomware attacks in the US on their oil and meat industries.

Year II – a few year 11 students had the opportunity to do undertake the discover computer science program with oxford university.

WITH MAYOR'S FUND FOR LONDON

This summer, we are thrilled to celebrate the outstanding achievement of our Year 9 students—Joey, Diana, Sneha, Hannah, and Sophia —who represented our school at the prestigious Count on Us competition organised by the Jack Petchey Foundation in collaboration with the Mayor's Fund. This remarkable inter-school maths programme involves Year 7, 8, and 9 students from across London, aiming to boost confidence and fluency in mathematics.

Our team of five worked diligently in preparation, participating in school-based practices that culminated in an exhilarating tournament against peers from 79 schools. We are immensely proud to announce that they reached the finals, securing a top 10 position out of 79 participating schools!

The competition consisted of four major rounds that tested their mathematical prowess and teamwork:

Round 1: The students engaged in a thrilling game of probability and risk assessment, featuring a unique challenge known as "1vs1 2 Dice Hedgehog." This was the first time they had tackled such a format, and it proved both exciting and educational.



Round 2: In the GridLines challenge, the pupils collaborated as a team to analyse and create answers from a given data set, further enhancing their problem-solving skills.

Round 3: This round featured a rotation through 24 different game versions, allowing them to showcase their adaptability and guick-thinking skills. In between the second and third rounds, teams of two delved into data-chart analysis questions and creative mathematical puzzles, where interpreting data effectively was key.

Final Round: The final challenge put their algebra skills to the test through a multi-sequence of tasks, requiring them to follow complex instructions and uncover clues. With a whimsical theme of 'Winnie the Pooh going to space,' they even had to catch falling meteors and collect paper rocket clues, employing all the skills they had acquired throughout Key Stage 3.

Two **Year 8** classes have taken part in an exciting new initiative in partnership with the English and Media Centre (EMC). Students have been exploring Literary Shorts. The

Year 10 - our Year 10 cohort have completed their component 1 controlled assessments. For this final section conducted after Easter, the students were asked to focus on the Film and TV industry based on the exam board brief of 'media from within Korean and Japanese culture'. The students have completed a significant analysis, written over the course of 7 hours! The analysis has explored a range of genres and filmmaking styles including, Anime, horror and action. In the last few weeks the cohort have begun preparing for component 2, which is a practical unit. The students have experimented with media forms including magazine front covers and film trailers to prepare them for the real assessment beginning in September.

Year 11 - our Year 11 students have completed their component 3 assessments, producing some fantastic work in the process, including promotional films, animations and poster campaigns. The brief this year is to produce a marketing product for a fictional organisation named We Care UK, making young people more aware of what it is to be a carer. Economics

This term, our Year 12 students have made an excellent start to their A Level studies, engaging with new content in a focused and enthusiastic manner. We have been exploring key microeconomic topics including revenue, cost, and profit, as well as economies of scale and how firms can expand efficiently. These foundational concepts are essential as we move towards more advanced material in the coming months.

Alongside this, students have been developing their research and presentation skills by investigating the current economic situation in a range of countries. They examined key economic indicators such as GDP growth, inflation and unemployment, and considered the main challenges facing their chosen countries—proposing thoughtful, economically sound solutions.

A particularly insightful presentation came from Alexandra and Hafsa, who focused on the Democratic Republic of Congo. They examined the country's

heavy dependence on mineral exports, particularly cobalt, and how price fluctuations impact national income. They also highlighted the challenges of political instability and high structural unemployment, suggesting that greater investment in infrastructure and education could help to support long-term development. Their clear analysis and confident delivery demonstrated both understanding and creativity.

Geography

Year 7 started the term by learning about rainforest plant and animal adaptations. They then moved onto Sustainable Urban Areas, where they learnt about key features of sustainable communities, how homes can be made more sustainable and how cities are aiming to be sustainable (eg. Stockholm and Freiberg).

Year 8 started Summer term learning about Cold Environments. They learnt about the formation of glaciers, the different plant and animal adaptations and how humans cope with living in the Arctic. We then moved on to Rivers where we looked at the water cycle, the river's profile and the landforms along the river from south to mouth.



Year 9 students are coming to the end of their Key Stage 3 adventure and this term they looked at the important topic of Resource Management . This raised important questions about where resources should be conserved and how resources are unevenly distributed around the world.

Well done to all KS3 students for their dedication to revision and End of Year exams. Students have produced some excellent revision clocks!

Year 10 have worked incredibly hard to complete their Human fieldwork enquiry and focused on practice exam questions. They then moved into Rivers which involved physical processes such as erosion, transportation and deposition but also looking carefully at specific landforms and case studies to support our exam knowledge. Year 12 have been developing their exam techniques and geographical skills in preparation for their AS exams. They have all worked very hard with this and we look forward to celebrating their success in August. We have continued with the course; Global Governance and Water and Carbon.

What an absolute pleasure it has been teaching **Year 11** and 13 this year! They have been outstanding Geographers and we wish them all the best in their exam and their future paths. We look forward to many Year 11s returning to join us for A Level.



Earth Fest 2025

Year 7 Geographers were invited to Earth Fest today at Kings Cross in June. We started the day at Camley Street Natural Park, London Wildlife Trust where we explored the amazing oasis of green within the urban area of King's Cross and made Seed Bombs.Session was a talk by two PHD students from Imperial University about their climate changes related research project. One was studying monitoring and managing droughts in the Andes and the other research drone use for monitoring bird patterns. Our third session was a careers fair looking at sustainable and green jobs, followed by a talk by Jane Goodalls' Roots and Shoots charity. Next we attended a talk about air pollution and social inequalities, where we listened to Minister Kerry McCarthy and L'Myah Sherae. It was inspiring to hear what actions are taking place and our role with tackling these inequalities. Our last session was on sustainable fashion. This interactive workshop challenged our ideas on repairing, recycling, swapping and sharing clothes in order to be more sustainable.

Psychology



Year 9 students get Psych'd Up for GCSE Psychology and Sociology. This term, our enthusiastic Year 9 students who have opted to study Psychology or Sociology next year have been attending our newly launched Psychology club: Psych'd Up. The club introduces key concepts by exploring how everyday behaviours can be explained through Psychological and Sociological theories. Students tested their critical thinking in a card game called Imposter, where they had to identify which dinner party guest was... an imposter. Each student was assigned a character card belonging to the working-class, middle-class, or upper-class. This led to insightful discussions about class-based and gender-based inequalities - an important theme in GCSE Sociology. In another activity, a lively game of Dobble demonstrated the role of attention in memory. Students



learned that without paying close attention to incoming stimuli, information may not enter the short-term memory - an idea central to the Multi-Store Model of Memory, a topic in GCSE

Psychology. Through these interactive sessions, students have begun developing their analytical and evaluative skills needed for success in the subjects. We are excited to see how these budding Psychologists and Sociologists build on this foundation in Year 10.



Year 10

Our Year 10 Psychologists have now completed one of two units of their GCSE course. Since returning to lessons, they have been introduced to three key debates in Psychology: nature vs nurture, free will vs determinism, and holism vs reductionism. They have shown impressive insight by linking these debates to topics already studied, such as memory; sleep and dreaming, and social influence. This has allowed them to demonstrate a holistic understanding of the subject, and to think critically about how psychological theories are applied and evaluated. Well done to all students for their continued hard work.

Year 12

Congratulations to our Year 12 Psychology students for successfully completing their AS examinations! Since returning for the summer term, they have shown great enthusiasm and maturity by engaging with the more advanced Year 13 content. As part of their progression, students have delved into their final two theoretical approaches of the A Level specification: Freud's Psychodynamic approach and the Humanistic approach. Building on their prior knowledge, students have developed a more holistic understanding of Psychology by critically comparing all six major approaches, considering key debates, real-world application, and scientific value. Their ability to think critically and holistically reflects their growing confidence as young Psychologists. We are proud of their achievements and look forward to seeing their continued progress as they prepare for Year 13.



Finally, well done to our year 11 and 13 students for completing their final set of public exams. We wish them the very best of luck with their upcoming results!

Science

This year, our students have engaged in a wide variety of scientific investigations, practical experiments, and classroom discussions designed to foster curiosity and critical thinking. From exploring chemical reactions to investigating ecosystems, students have demonstrated enthusiasm and resilience in developing their scientific understanding. A particular highlight this term was our successful Year 5 STEM Club, which welcomed pupils from five local primary schools for two dedicated afternoons of science activities. The visiting students learned how to safely use Bunsen burners and carried out experiments burning different foods to investigate their energy content. It was a pleasure to see their excitement and curiosity, and we hope these sessions have inspired future young scientists. We are grateful to our science staff and student volunteers who helped ensure these sessions were both educational and enjoyable.

To encourage continued learning over the summer, we recommend a balance of structured activities and informal exploration. Simple projects such as home experiments, nature walks, and stargazing can reinforce classroom concepts in a relaxed environment. Students may also find value in online resources such as BBC Bitesize Science and educational documentaries, which can consolidate knowledge in an engaging manner. For students entering examination years in September, early revision is advised. Reviewing key topics from the past year will build confidence and
