# **POLITICS**

#### A LEVEL COURSE DESCRIPTION

Politics is very much a 'live' subject. It involves the study of events which have happened and are happening all the time. Consequently, Politics provides an explanation of the world which is unfolding around us and is directly relevant to life today. Through a study of Politics, students will be able to explore how our country and others are governed and gain an understanding of political life. This course will appeal to students who take an interest in and enjoy debating current affairs and politics.

### **ENTRY REQUIREMENTS**


Students are required to gain a minimum of grade 6 at GCSE English. To succeed in Politics, the student not only needs to be prepared to use the appropriate texts provided, but must read newspapers regularly and take an interest in current affairs programmes on television and radio. Personal research is vital if the aims of the subject are to be fully achieved. It is helpful if students have some knowledge of British History and good written English is essential.



## Progression

The overall course is a perfect basis for progression to the study of Philosophy, Politics and Economics (PPE) at Russell Group universities including UCL, Oxford and Cambridge.





#### **MAIN AREAS OF STUDY**

This exam is now linear, which means students will gain a grade based on their overall performance at the end of Year 13. Students follow the Edexcel syllabus which is divided into three modules of study. Two modules equal in length are studied in Year 12 and these focus on the structure and workings of the UK political system. Students will have the opportunity to sit the AS at the end of Year 12. It is expected that all students will proceed to take the full A Level in Year 13.
