### MUSIC A LEVEL COURSE DESCRIPTION

This specification provides learners with the opportunity to study music in an integrated way where the skills of performing, composing and appraising reinforce knowledge and understanding of musical elements, contexts and language. In addition to the appraising examination, all learners will be assessed in both performing and composing.

The specification allows learners to specialise in either performing or composing.

Learners will develop knowledge and understanding of music through three areas of study.

- The Western Classical Tradition (The Development of the Symphony)
- Rock and Pop / Musical Theatre
- Into the Twentieth Century

### ENTRY REQUIREMENTS

Students should have at least grade 6 at GCSE in Music. Being Grade 4 standard or higher in an instrument or voice is highly advantageous, as is the ability to read staff notation.

Students are expected to perform on their own and in a group in any style, on any instrument or voice, including band and orchestral instruments. They should be keen to explore how great pieces of music were put together, and apply some of these techniques when composing their own music. They should be keen to listen to a variety of music, analysing what they hear in order to make connections between different pieces and describe how styles have evolved.



















### Progression

A-Level in Music is the perfect preparation for studying Music at University, which could lead to any of the following careers:

Performing Musician/Orchestra Member, Conductor, Session Musician, Composer, Teaching, Radio Presenter/ DJ, Sound Engineering, Arts Programming, Concert Promotion/Administration, Music Therapy.

You might also work towards the following ways to develop you career in the music industry: Music Studio Apprenticeship, Music Therapy, Radio Station Internship, Music Magazine/Website Work Experience,



### SUMMARY OF ASSESSMENT

For this specification learners must choose either Option A in both Components I and 2 or Option B in both Components I and 2. All learners must study Component 3.

#### COMPONENT 1: PERFORMING Option A:Total duration of performances: 10-12 minutes | 35% of qualification

A performance consisting of a minimum of three pieces. At least one of these pieces must be as a soloist. The other pieces may be either as a soloist or as part of an ensemble or a combination of both. One piece must reflect the musical characteristics of one area of study. At least one other piece must reflect the musical characteristics of one other, different area of study.

# Option B:Total duration of performances: 6-8 minutes | 25% of qualification

A performance consisting of a minimum of two pieces either as a soloist or as part of an ensemble or a combination of both. One piece must reflect the musical characteristics of one area of study.

Non-exam assessment: externally assessed by a visiting examiner.





#### COMPONENT 2: COMPOSING Option A: Total duration of compositions: 4-6 minutes | 25% of qualification

Two compositions, one of which must reflect the musical techniques and conventions associated with the Western Classical Tradition and be in response to a brief set by WJEC. Learners will have a choice of four set briefs, released during the first week of September in the academic year in which the assessment is to be taken. The second composition is a free composition.

## Option B:Total duration of compositions: 8-10 minutes | 35% of qualification

Three compositions, one of which must reflect the musical techniques and conventions associated with the Western Classical Tradition and be in response to a brief set by WJEC. Learners will have a choice of four set briefs, released during the first week of September in the academic year in which the assessment is to be taken. The second composition must reflect the musical characteristics of one different area of study while the third composition is a free composition.

Non-exam assessment: externally assessed by WJEC

### **COMPONENT 3: APPRAISING**

Written examination: 2 hours 15 minutes 40% of qualification

### Three areas of study:

The Western Classical Tradition (The Development of the Symphony 1750-1900) which includes two set works.

Choose one set work for detailed analysis and the other for general study.

- Symphony No. 104 in D major, 'London': Haydn
- Symphony No. 4 in A major, 'Italian': Mendelssohn

A choice of one area of study from:

- Rock and Pop
- Musical Theatre

The third area of study is Into the Twentieth Century including two set works:

- Trio for Oboe, Bassoon and Piano, Movement II: Poulenc
- Three Nocturnes, Number 1, Nuages: Debussy

#### Questions:

- I. Set work analysis with a score
- 2. Extended responses on wider context
- 3. Unprepared extracts of music with and without a score
- 4. Comparison questions

This component includes a listening examination.
