Business Studies



GCSE Business introduces students to how businesses operate and to what degree they can be impacted by society, the wider economy and the competitive environment. In addition, how developments in technology are impacting businesses; students will also investigate various departments within a business such as Marketing, Human Resources, Operations and Finance to determine how they each contribute to the success of business.



This subject should be chosen if you have an interest in businesses; how they function, thrive and grow. An ability to communicate well in written form is desirable as you will have to analyse business situations and make judgements.

There is no coursework, assessment is 100% exam based. However, we will look at plenty of real businesses during the course and do practical investigations of how businesses work.

The subject will help with an awareness of the working environment, but equally contribute towards developing key employability skills such as teamwork, leadership and decision making.

BTEC Tech Award in Creative Digital Media Production

This course is designed for those wishing to prepare for the world of work in digital media.

Entry level positions in this field include assistant web designer, editorial assistant, junior photographer, assistant game designer, production assistant or games tester.

You will be required to apply skills learnt in a work-related context. This could take the form of

- Independent projects
- Team projects
- Individual controlled assessment

Computer Science



GCSE (9-1) Computer Science gives you an excellent opportunity to investigate how computers work, how they are used and to develop computer programming and problem solving skills.

Component 01 – Computer Systems

This is a written paper, which has a mixture of short and long answer questions. You will need to explore what makes a computer system, how to calculate data storage and the use of binary within a computer system and the ethical, legal, cultural and environmental impacts that technology has within our lives. It is an examined unit and makes up 50% of the assessment total.

This is a new written exam, focused on computational thinking and algorithms. You will be tested on the elements of computational thinking and logic. You will learn how to write, correct and improve algorithms. Makes up 50% of the assessment total.



Drama



What do we do?

In GCSE Drama, you will learn to create performances using different performance styles and genres. You will learn how meaning is communicated through drama as well as how to write about drama using appropriate terminology.

How do we do it?

In Year 10, you will devise a performance using a particular genre of theatre. You will produce a portfolio of supporting evidence to document the devising and rehearsal process (coursework) as well as writing an evaluation of the final performance in controlled conditions. The devised performance, supporting evidence and written evaluation are, all together, worth 40% of your final grade. In Year 11, you will rehearse two different extracts from one play to perform to the visiting examiner. You will be assessed on your acting skills (20%). You will also study a different play for the written exam at the end of Year 11 (40%). You will be asked a series of questions on the play and you will be assessed on your ability to explore the play from the point of view of an actor, a designer and a director.

Transferable skills... or what can drama do for me?

A qualification in Drama proves your ability to discuss ideas and to think creatively. It proves that you are able to listen well to others and can be sympathetic. Drama also promotes essential lifeskills, for example: good organisation, co-operation and effective communication.

Why choose Drama at St Angela's?

The department has an excellent track record with all students achieving at the highest level. Some students then go on to study Drama at A Level and at university; however, more than anything, a qualification in Drama is highly attractive to employers because it proves that you are able to work well alongside others and that you can communicate your ideas effectively.

Geography

Why study Geography?

'Geography helps make sense of the world around you' Royal Geographical Society.

In geography you will study a range of topics that relate to big issues which affect our world, and get an insight into a variety of the most important and relevant geographical issues. Geography empowers students to become better informed about our world whilst gaining highly valued transferable skills.

You will therefore develop numeracy and literacy skills, data collection and analysis skills, and finally communication and decision making skills.

Geography is a highly respected subject by universities and employers. It is seen as a facilitating subject due to the wide range of skills developed. Universities highly value these skills and critical thinking within the subject for a wide range of degrees. Therefore it gives you a wide range of future opportunities and options. Geography graduates have one of the highest rates of employment, pursuing a wide range of career paths. Geography takes you places... There are a huge range of direct career paths but as a facilitating subject with highly valued skills it can lead to jobs in finance, business, law and politics.

Where will our fieldtrips be?

Fieldtrips are a compulsory part of the GCSE and must include one investigation in an urban environment and one in a coastal environment. We currently visit Stratford and Walton-on-the-Naze but we are always looking for opportunities for other locations to deepen our learning.

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History

Why study GCSE History?

Historians look at how things have developed over time and connect the dots to understand how we got to where we are today in Britain and the wider world.

Music graduates are also highly valued in professions where people have to take initiative and solve problems, like finance and banking, law and consultancy.









In your lessons you will learn about the fundamental principles and concepts of Sport Studies. You will develop your skills as a performer in two different sporting activities and learn how to lead sporting activity sessions. You will also develop the skills of team working, research and planning and understand that sports performance goes far beyond just the simple physical activity of sport. You will complete two written assignments which will form part of your final assignment.







Exam Paper

Contemporary issues in sport

This is assessed by an exam. 75 minutes written paper 70 marks

By completing this unit you will understand a range of topical and contemporary issues in sport, including learning about participation levels and barriers to completing sporting activities. You will also learn how participation is impacted by the promotion of values and ethical behaviour, about the role of high-profile sporting events, the role of national governing bodies and how technology is used within sport.

Topics include:

- · Issues which affect participation in sport
- The role of sport in promoting values
- The implications of hosting a major sporting event for a city or country
- The role National Governing Bodies play in the development of their sport
- · The use of technology in sport.

Written Coursework

Performance and leadership in sports studies

This is assessed by a set assignment.

OCR moderated 80 marks

In this unit you will have an opportunity to develop your skills both as a performer in two different sporting activities, and as a leader, developing a range of transferable skills. You will work both independently and as part of a team, including communicating with team mates as well as being in front of an audience when you perform.

Topics include:

- Key components of performance
- Applying practice methods to support improvement in a sporting activity
- Organising and planning a sports activity session
- · Leading a sports activity session
- Reviewing your own performance in planning and leading a sports activity session.

Sport and the media

This is assessed by a set assignment. OCR moderated 40 marks

In this unit you will understand the different sides of a range of media sources and apply real life examples to show the nature of the relationship between media and sport. You will then develop your ability to evaluate and interpret the different ways in which sport is represented by the media.

Topics include:

- The different sources of media that cover sport
- Positive effects of the media in sport
- · Negative effects of the media in sport

Psychology



which allows students to study human behaviour and the brain. In order to do this, the course has a range of units which provide students with an understanding of how biological, cognitive and environmental factors influence everyday behaviours.





All of the units covered are relevant and can be applied to our student's everyday lives. For example, during the first year of study students will explore the functions of sleep and why we dream. During the second year of study, student's study Criminal Psychology and Psychological Problems such as Depression and Schizophrenia, which provide our students with a better understanding of the world around them.

Psychology is a multi-faceted subject which develops a range of our student's skills. Their understanding of biological processes is enhanced through studying the brain, their literacy skills are developed through constructing well-structured essays and their mathematical skills are utilised through analysing data. At St Angela's we include a range of practical tasks which build our students research skills, which is an essential skill within the field of Psychology.

Psychology is a dynamic subject which will open your mind and develop a range of your academic skills.

Sociology



What is Sociology?

Sociology is the systematic study of society and social groups. It aims to increase our understanding of the social world we live in by looking at how institutions such as the family, education system and criminal justice system can have an effect on our individual behaviour. Sociologists are interested in exploring social processes, such as socialisation and social control. By doing so, we can understand how our society works and examine a variety of social issues, such as poverty, racism and rising crime rates.

As part of the GCSE course, students will be introduced to classical sociological theories such as Marxism, Functionalism

and Weberianism. Students will learn the key ideas of classical sociologists including Durkheim, Marx and Weber, referring to their view of the world and their contribution to the development of the discipline. In addition, students will learn about the multitude of ways in which sociologists conduct research in society. For example, through the use of questionnaires, interviews and observations. The course is designed and delivered to nurture thoughtful and motivated young people, who can act responsibly as active citizens, and who believe in their ability to change their community for the better.

Other sociological questions that will be explored during the course are:

- What causes crime in society?
- Why are some groups more likely to experience poverty than others?
- Why is there an over-representation of some ethnic minority groups in the UK prison population?
- Do men and women have equal roles within the family?

What is ASDAN?

The ASDAN Personal and Social Development qualifications (PSD) offer imaginative activities and personal challenges that support young people in becoming confident individuals who are physically, emotionally and socially happy. ASDAN is a charity with awarding organisation status that provides courses to thousands of UK and international schools, colleges and training providers.

The qualification aims to support young people in:

- developing and improving knowledge and understanding of personal and social issues
- · developing a wide range of qualities, abilities and achievements
- getting involved with practical tasks
- · introducing them to new activities and challenges

This helps students to become confident individuals and responsible citizens who can make a positive contribution to society.



Students can work towards Entry Level 1, 2 and 3; and also Levels 1 and 2 PSD qualifications.

To achieve the PSD Award qualification, students must gain 8 credits by completing Unit challenges and providing evidence to demonstrate the development of knowledge at the appropriate level.

Students can be awarded unit certificates for any units completed.
